

Neighborhood based support services for the well-being of older adults in Indian urban neighborhoods

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Aim of the study

Exploring the neighborhood based support services for the elderly and their influence on the overall perceived Quality of Life (QoL) of Indian elderly

Objectives

- Study of the existing set of neighborhood based support services for elderly or older adults in different neighborhoods in Kolkata, India
- Understanding if the presence or absence of neighborhood based support services influences the perception of overall QoL of elderly.

Methodology

- Step 1: Understanding of the need for neighborhood based support services for the elderly in contributing to the overall QoL of the elderly
- Step 2: Exploration of the varied types of neighborhood based support services for the elderly from literature
- Step 3: Identification of the existing varied types of neighborhood based support services in the study area
- Step 4: Exploring the influence of neighborhood based support services on the overall QoL of the elderly

Background

- The Indian joint family structure is gradually depleting due to the shifting of youth away from their home (Ugargol, Hutter, James, & Bailey, 2016).
- Since a significant proportion of the Indian elderly still prefer to depend primarily on family based intergenerational support, this situation is likely to create a sense of insecurity and uncertainty among the Indian elderly.
- Deteriorating health conditions negatively influences the independence of the elderly, their social participation and social relationships which consequently leads to an overall decline in their QoL (Bowling, 2011).
- Presently, India lacks a holistic system of external support services which can cater to the daily care giving of the elderly.

Background

- The contribution of community and neighbourhood based support services to the overall well-being and QoL of the elderly has been established by various studies (Muramatsu & Hedeker, 2016; Siegler et al., 2015; Zhang, Yeager & Hou, 2018).
- The expense involved in institutional care, also creates a need to promote aging-in-place and equipping the neighbourhood environment to accommodate the needs and requirements of the elderly, thus helping them to live an active, independent life, particularly in case of populous and poor countries.

Background

What are neighbourhood based support services?

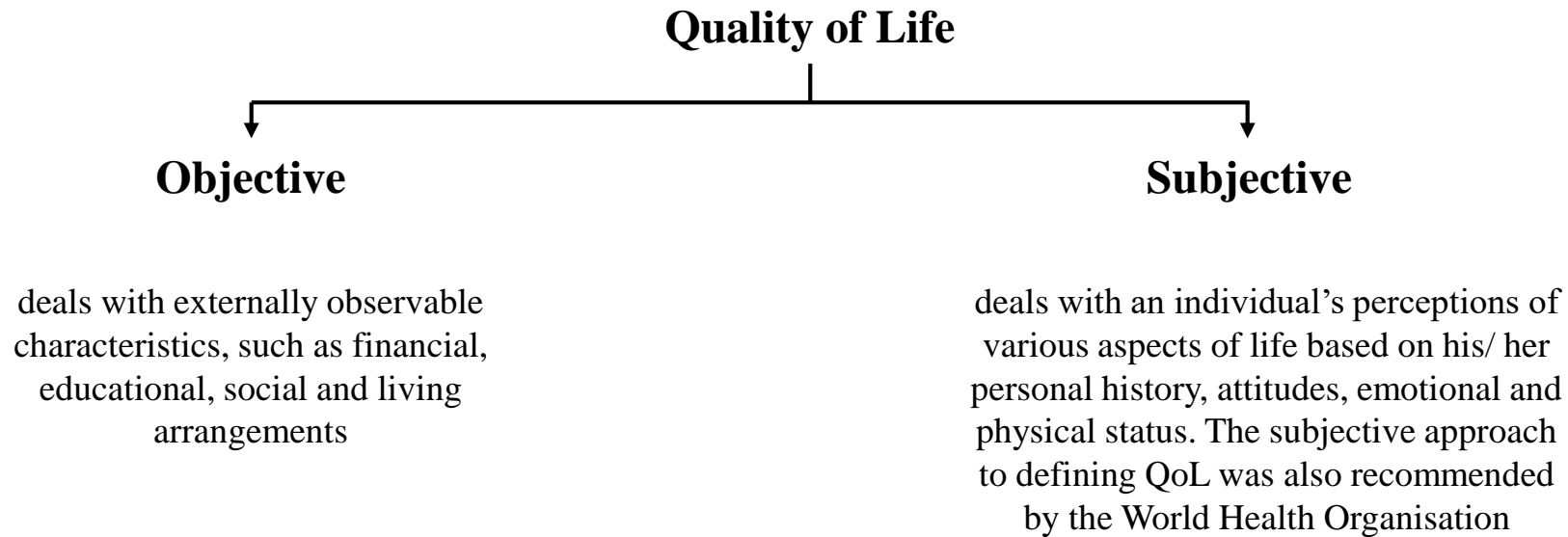
The concept of Neighbourhood based support services (NBSS) are similar to home/community based services (HCBS) which aim at providing health and social services to support the elderly, patients and their care-givers.

It includes services which provide wellness programs, nutritional support, educational programs about health and aging, counselling services, general assistance with housing, finances, safety, etc ([Siegler et al., 2015](#)).

In this study, we also relate NBSS to the concept of Long-term care (LTC) which aims at providing services for people with disabilities ([Jervis, Jackson, & Manson, 2002](#)).

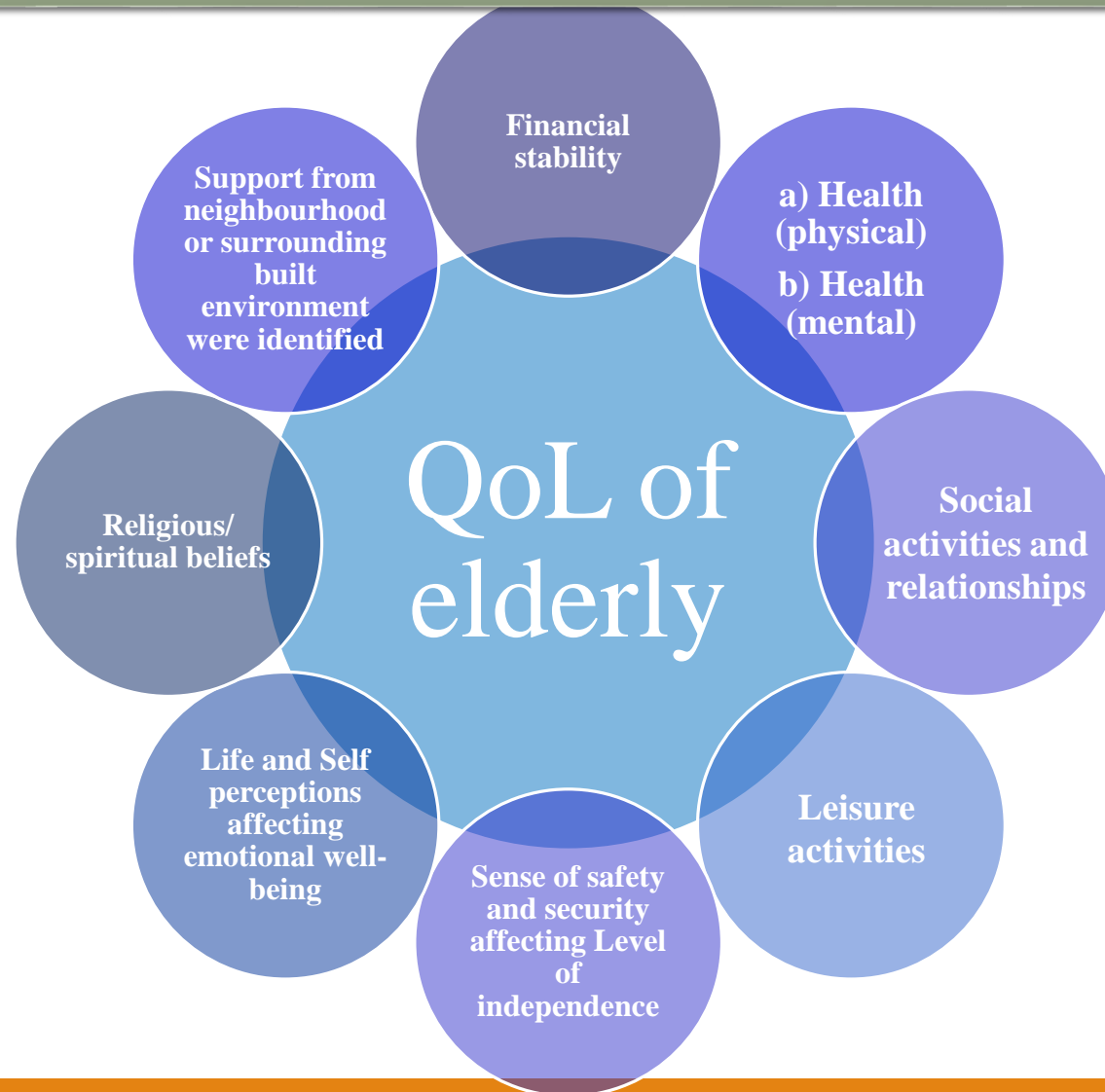
The services include various forms of assistance which the elderly have been traditionally receiving from their family: provision of companions during evening walks, gardening, reading or writing, meals on wheels, daily grocery or medicine delivery services, house cleaning, travel guides and other activities of daily living.

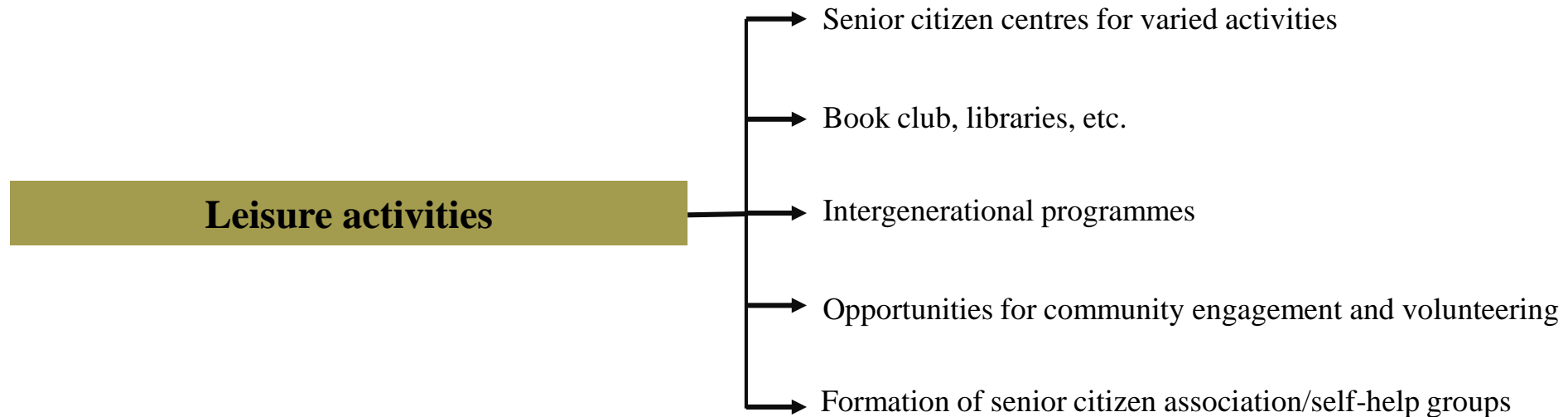

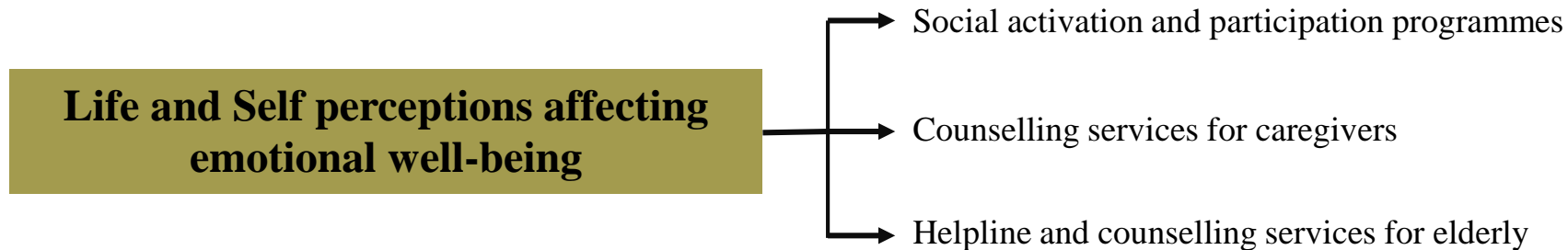

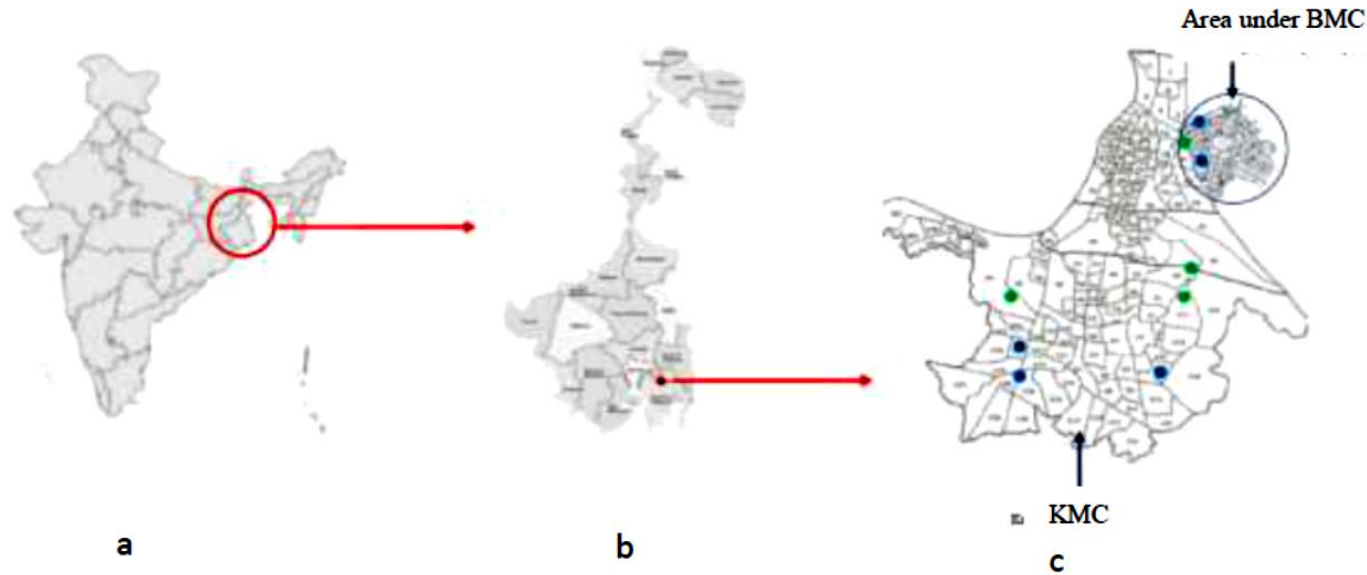
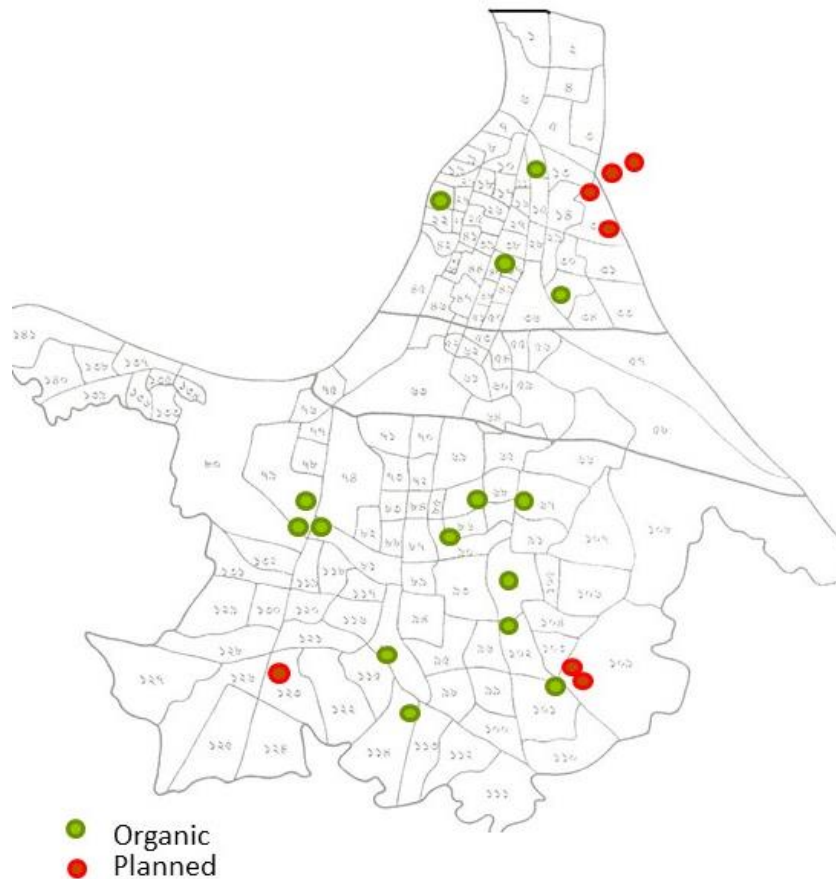


Figure 4.1: a) Location of West Bengal in India, b) Location of KMC and BMC in West Bengal c) Location of study areas in KMC and BMC

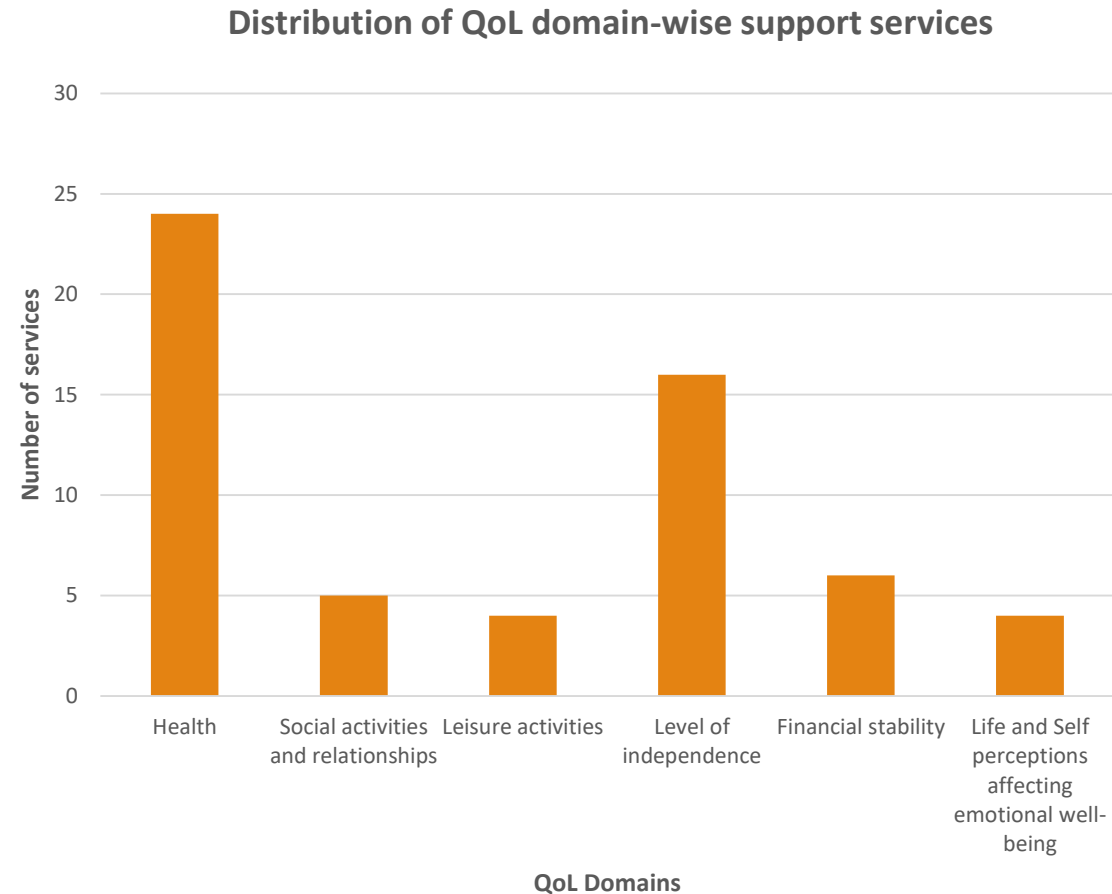

Health

24x7 ambulance services for elderly
Help from local youth and volunteers appointed by municipality or the neighbourhood for elderly care
Regular spraying of mosquito repellants in mosquito prone areas
Organisation of awareness programmes on physical exercise & outdoor visit
Collection of blood, stool samples, etc. from home by diagnostic laboratories or volunteers
Organizing regular home visit of medical doctors/ professionals
Provision of trained ayahs and elderly care givers for those in need
Control of stray dog population
Regular check on pollution levels in neighbourhood
Smoking fines to be enforced on smokers for smoking in public areas
Availability of assistance (helping elderly in daily activities) on call
Organizing regular home visit of medical doctors/ professionals
Training on fall prevention programs & regular checks on falls of elderly
Appointment of trained elderly care givers through NGOs/ local clubs

Neighbourhood watch conducted by volunteers (local youth) or security guards employed by the neighbours

Arrangement of security guard for elderly living alone

24X7 helplines for crime control

Generating awareness about services for helping needy people, through newspapers, leaflets or phone calls,etc. by NGOs. or local volunteers

Provision of safety guidelines to elderly from the community police

Availability of assistance (helping elderly in daily activities) on call

24x7 on call helpline services

System of registering road related e-complaints at the municipality/ corporation

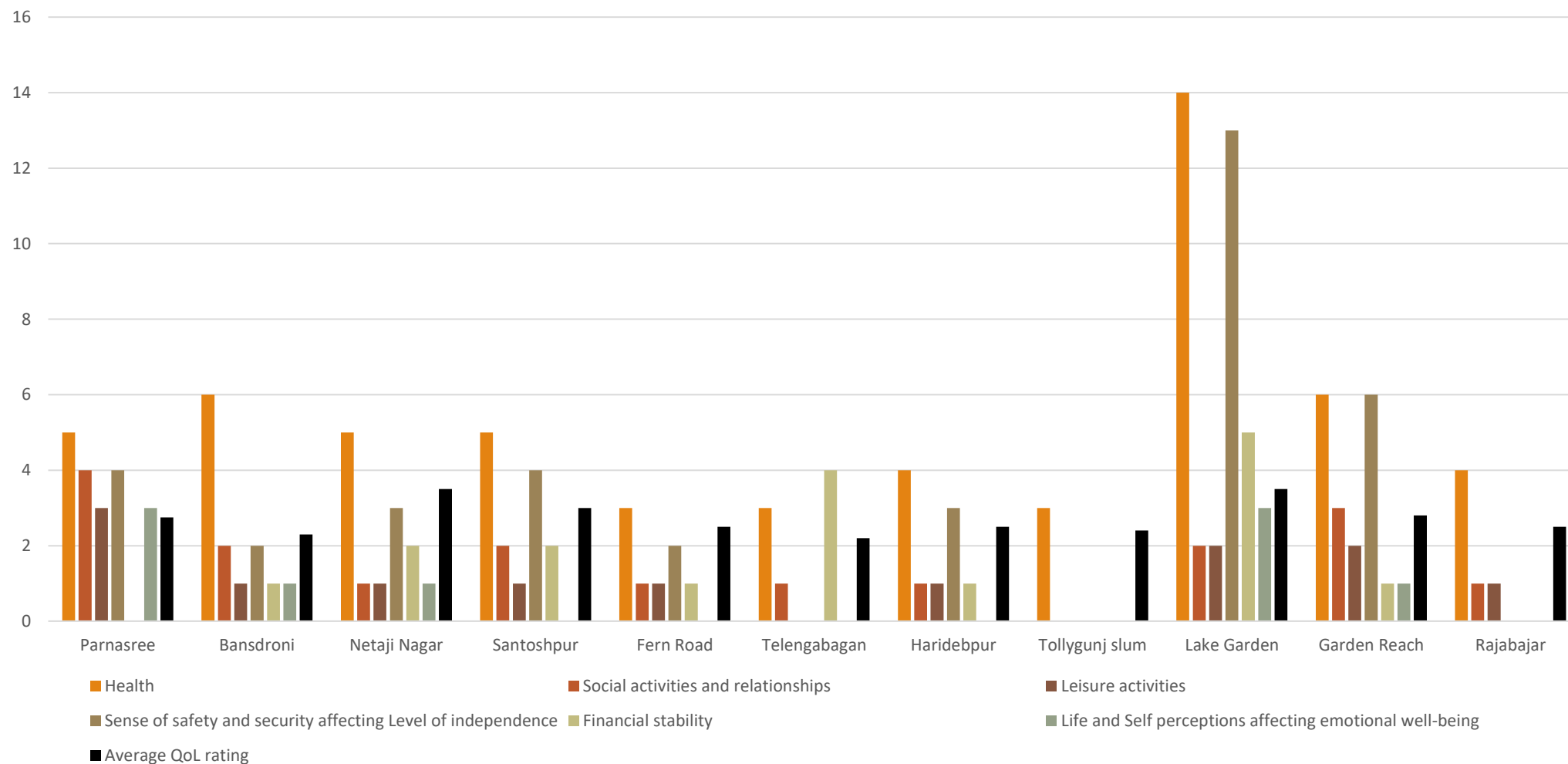

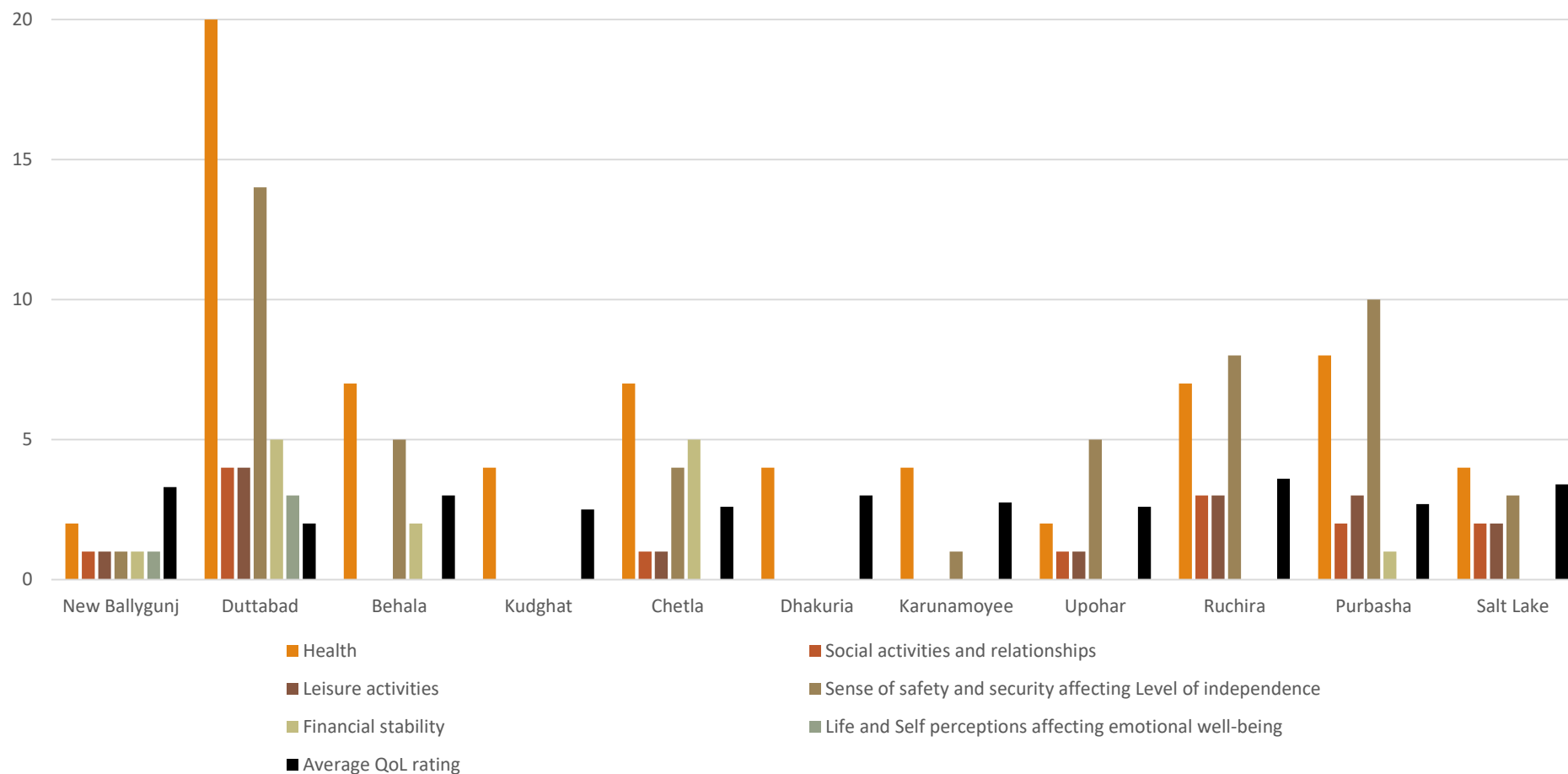

Conclusion and way forward

- The study has identified the holistic set of support services that can cater to the QoL of elderly.
- The study findings reveal that among all the domains, the support services catering to the domain of Health exist in almost all the study areas.
- Though the study findings show a positive influence of the number of support services on the overall QoL of the respondents, the findings from one particular study area also reveal that the mere presence of support services is not enough to ensure satisfaction with overall QoL. Access (spatial and financial) to these support services are essential to ensure efficiency.
- The limitations of the study include the sample size and sample distribution. The study framework can be applied on a larger sample to validate the influence of the support services on the overall QoL of the elderly.
- The future scope of work can include the influence of socio-economic characteristics of respondents on the satisfaction with the support services and consequently on their overall QoL.
